Is there mold in my laundry?

When the door is closed, you've got a sealed environment, and the moisture builds up and breeds mold right in the very machine that you wash your family's clothing. Mold in your washing machine and towels or other laundry not only smells bad, but also has negative effects on your health. Skin sensitivities and allergies can lead to rashes. Your skin is the largest organ in your body, and is exceptionally permeable; it quickly absorbs outside substances directly into the bloodstream.
